2008 TRAILBLAZER AWARD TO MARY ANN JOHNSON

Mary Ann Johnson, aviation historian and author who has supported aviation-related projects in the Dayton-Miami Valley area for over 25 years, is the recipient of the 2008 Trailblazer Award presented annually by Aviation Trail, Inc.


The award banquet and ceremonies will be Wednesday, April 16, at the Presidential Banquet Center, 4548 Presidential Dr., Kettering, Ohio. The event begins with a social at 6:30 p.m. followed by dinner at 6:45 p.m. and, at about 7:30, the Trailblazer ceremony and Ms. Johnson's speech. The public is welcome.

Ms. Johnson's published work includes A Field Guide to Flight: On the Aviation Trail in Dayton, Ohio which tells the stories behind the more than 40 designated sites on the Dayton area's Aviation Trail.

Her more recent book, McCook Field 1917-1927: The Force Behind America's Golden Age of Flight, describes the field's numerous pioneering research projects that underlie today's modern aerospace technology. Both are published by Landfall Press of Dayton, Ohio.

Currently secretary on the Aviation Trail Board of Trustees, Ms. Johnson is a founding member of the Trail and a board member since its incorporation as a nonprofit corporation in 1981. Her speech will tell about some of her experiences in writing the two books, which will bring in some of the story of Aviation Trail's history.

A native Daytonian and resident of Washington Township, Ms. Johnson was a stay-at-home mother until her and her husband Rich's four children were grown. She then returned to school to obtain a Master's degree in economics from Wright State University, Fairborn, Ohio. Her Bachelor's degree in sociology--earned before her marriage--is from Miami University, Oxford, Ohio.



Ms. Johnson became interested in local aviation history after helping to plan a regional economic development conference at the University of Dayton in 1980 while she was an economic planner on the staff of the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission. She also has served as a part-time instructor in economics at Sinclair Community College, Dayton, and worked on various local and national survey research projects.

The Trailblazer banquet and award ceremony commemorates Wilbur Wright's April birthday (April 16, 1867) and has been held annually since 1983. AVIATION TRAIL RECEIVES \$10,000 GRANT FROM THE DAYTON FOUNDATION

Aviation Trail, Inc. is pleased to announce its receipt of a \$10,000 grant from The Dayton Foundation toward completion of its Parachute Museum in Dayton, Ohio.

The grant is from the Foundation's Mary E. Gundersen Endowment Fund established in 1994 to improve the community by providing discretionary funds to the Foundation's Governing Board. Mary E. Gundersen was the first employee of the Huffy Corporation, where she worked for 49 years.

Marvin Christian, president of Aviation Trail, said that the Trail's Board of Trustees is extremely appreciative to the Foundation. "We are so pleased that an organization of the stature of The Dayton Foundation has chosen to show confidence in our efforts to tell the story of parachute development--much of which happened in Dayton's backyard--in museum exhibits. We thank them and will use the money wisely."

The Parachute Museum--a work in progress since its opening in 2003--is on the second floor of the Aviation Trail building at West Third and Williams streets in Dayton. Its exhibits and displays tell the story of the development of the freefall parachute from its invention at Dayton's McCook Field after World War I to the vital role it plays in safely landing today's spacecraft.

The museum's displayed artifacts are primarily from the parachute collection of Dave Gold, now deceased, who was fascinated with chutes and began collecting them in 1922 when he worked in Dayton. He collected items from both McCook Field and its successor Wright Field, now part of Wright-Patterson Air Force Base.

Since there is museum space for only a small part of the Dave Gold collection, the remainder is in secure storage and its papers and films are with Wright State University's Paul Laurence Dunbar Library, Special Collections and Archives, where they were catalogued and made available on-line at www.libraries.wright.edu/special/ Money from The Dayton Foundation will be applied toward the museum's ongoing exhibit development program, specifically, an exhibit on Col. Joe Kittinger (USAF Ret.), balloonist and test pilot. Paul. P. Brown, emeritus member of the board of trustees and one of Aviation Trail's 18 incorporating trustees, is another donor for the exhibit.

Contractor for the Kittinger exhibit is Exhibit Concepts, Vandalia, Ohio, with Mainsail Production Services of Dayton providing design support. Target completion date for completion of their work is this summer.

The focus of Colonel Kittinger's exhibit will be an interactive, question-and-answer display in which the colonel's pre-recorded voice is heard in reply to recorded questions. A background mural will feature the colonel's famous Aug. 16, 1960, gondola ascent in *Excelsior III* to 102,800 feet and a freefall before his parachute opened at 12,000 feet. Project Excelsior proved the human capability to survive high-altitude aircraft ejections and contributed to potential escape methods for astronauts.

WRIGHT SITES POSSIBLY WORLD HERITAGE SITES

We made the cut!

Four sites related to the Wright brothers in the Dayton area might find themselves--some day--in the same prestigious U.S. "club" with the Grand Canyon and Independence Hall in Philadelphia.

The "club" members are cultural or natural places and things in the United States selected by the United Nations UNESCO (United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization) as U.S. World Heritage Sites.

Recently, the Wrights' sites made the "cut" to a list of 14 chosen by Secretary of the Interior Dirk Kempthorne from 35 sites nominated to the Interior Department. Aviation Trail supported the nomination of the Wright sites in a letter signed by President Marvin Christian.

The chosen local sites are The Wright Cycle Co. and Wright Printing in Dayton, Hawthorne Hill in Oakwood, the Wright Flyer III airplane in Carillon Historical Park, and Huffman Prairie Flying Field on Wright-Patterson Air Force Base. The Hopewell Ceremonial Earthworks in southern Ohio also made the revised list.

Except for Hawthorne Hill, which is owned by the Wright Family Foundation, the sites are part of the National Park Service's Dayton Aviation Heritage National Historical Park. All four sites are on the Aviation Trail.

Next the U.S. government--after a one-year waiting period--can nominate two sites a year to UNESCO for final consideration for the World Heritage list. Will the Wright sites one day make the prestigious list? It's trite but true: only time will tell.

NAHF ENSHRINEMENT SET FOR JULY 19 AT THE DAYTON CONVENTION CENTER


The National Aviation Hall of Fame is holding its 47th Annual Enshrinement Dinner & Ceremony July 19 at the Dayton Convention Center.


As announced at Aviation Trail's Anniversary of Powered Flight Dinner in December, the enshrines are:


- --Col. Clarence E. "Bud" Anderson, USAF (Ret.), a veteran World War I triple ace and experimental test pilot
- --Herbert D. Kelleher, co-founder, former CEO, and executive chairman of Southwest Airlines
- --William A. Moffett, architect of naval military aviation, and
- --Sean D. Tucker, champion aerobatic air show performer and instructor.

The Hall of Fame has been adding up to five inductees each year since 1962. Its Learning and Research Center contains exhibits focused on American aviation history, with emphasis on the people who made that history.

NAHF SLATES AVIATION FILM FESTIVAL FOR APRIL 24-26

Dayton doesn't have the mountain scenery that surrounds the annual Sundance Film Festival in Park City, Utah.

But there'll be an aviation ambience for its inaugural film event--the "Reel Stuff' Film Festival--from April 24-26. And Academy Award-winning actor and NAHF enshrinee Cliff Robertson will be there to introduce "633 Squadron," which he starred in in 1964.

The National Aviation Hall of Fame is hosting the public festival and the festival's founder Ron Kaplan, also NAHF executive director, promises both feature films and independent documentaries focused on aviation. Each will be introduced by someone who worked on the film: an actor, producer, aerial coordinator or cinematographer.

Proceeds from the festival's ticket and merchandise sales, according to Kaplan, will benefit the NAHF's Learning and Research Center. Tickets are \$10 per film with a full-day ticket priced at \$25-\$55 and a three-day ticket at \$100. Locations for the film presentations will be Sinclair Community College Smith Auditorium, the Dayton Convention Center Theater and the IMAX Theatre in the National Museum of the United States Air Force.

Films to be screened are "Top Gun" to be introduced by aerial cinematographer Clay Lacy; "Battle of Britain," by stunt pilot Wilson "Connie" Edwards; and "One Six Right," by producer Brian J. Terwilliger.

Other films are "Battle Hymn," "Fighter Pilot: Operation Red Flag," "Pancho Barnes," and "Speed and Angels."

WORK UNDER WAY ON WRIGHT-DUNBAR PLAZA AND NEW ENTRANCE TO AVIATION TRAIL BLDG.

Wilcon Corp., Dayton, Ohio, has begun work under contract to the National Park Service on a new, main entrance to the Aviation Trail Visitor Center, Wright-Dunbar Interpretive Center, and the Wright-Dunbar plaza at West Third and Williams streets in Dayton.

Design for the work, which was requested by the Dayton Aviation Heritage National Historical Park, was accomplished by Ratio Architects, Inc. of Indianapolis. The project, to be completed in late summer, will provide more space for exterior exhibits and interpretive displays, better link the buildings at West Third and Williams streets and The Wright Cycle Co. (located to the south side of the plaza), and more fully communicate the story of the neighborhood.

The new design will make the entrance more obvious to visitors who sometimes overlook the current entry. The brick frieze depicting Wilbur and Orville Wright and Paul Laurence Dunbar will remain in its current position.

The Aviation Trail Board of Trustees supports this construction program and anticipates that visitors will enjoy the enhanced exhibit and display space. "This is yet another step forward--far forward--from the space's first use as a parking lot," said Marvin Christian, Aviation Trail president.

During construction, the park buildings and Aviation Trail building will remain open and operate during normal hours seven days a week: 8:30 a.m.-5: p.m.

All three buildings affected by the new plaza/entrance are sites on the Aviation Trail.

WRIGHT SEAPLANE BASE MOVES TOWARD INCORPORATION

Supporters of a monument commemorating the first seaplane base in America—on a bend of the Great Miami River near Dayton—are filing papers incorporating their group as a 501 (c)3 non-profit organization.

President is Harold Robinson; other officers are John Grumbles, vice-president; Donald Ferguson, secretary; and George R. Bockerstette, treasurer. Entities represented on the Board of Trustees are the city of West Carrollton, West Carrollton Historical Society, and the city of Moraine.

According to Ferguson, the monument most likely will be located in the Miami and Erie Canal Park which belongs to the city of West Carrollton.

The first seaplane site was used by the Wright Company between 1911 and 1913. The location was chosen because of a Hydraulic Low Dam which backed up a pool of water; there were no overhead wires or bridges; the bend of the river gave them different directions to take off into the wind; and Orville Wright could drive down the west side of the river to the base.

Airplane models tested there were the modified Model B's, the Model CH hydroplane, and the Model G aeroboat. Another local aviation group, the "Wright "B" Flyer, Inc. owns a replica wing section and outrigger of the Model G.

WOODLAND CEMETERY HOSTS HEROES OF AVIATION VIRTUAL TOUR

Woodland Cemetery and Arboretum is hosting its first "Heroes of Aviation Virtual Tour" Saturday, May 3, from 1-3 p.m.

The event will begin in the mausoleum off Woodland Avenue with a talk by volunteer Sherry Pecut, and then offer attendees the opportunity to walk to the gravesites, weather permitting.

Some lesser-known heroes to be featured include Ralph A. Von Derau, a flyer in the U.S. Army Air Corps during World War I and II; Dale White, a Tuskegee Airman; and Stephen W. Thompson, the first U.S. military man--who flew with the French--to shoot down an enemy aircraft in World War I.

More familiar names also will be featured: Wilbur and Orville Wright, Paul Laurence Dunbar and John H. Patterson, founder of the National Cash Register Co.
